 Presentation given by Leon Scioscia, President & CEO alongside Caroline Blanco, Chair of the Board of Directors



- Realizing the Workhouse Arts Center's long-standing vision requires coordination with several stakeholders
 - Workhouse Arts Foundation Board
 - Fairfax County Elected & Appointed Personnel
 - Fairfax County, State of Virginia, and Greater DMV Arts & Economic Organizations
 - Workhouse staff, artists, volunteers and patrons
- Workhouse Arts Center property itself is owned by Fairfax County and the Workhouse is a non-profit that has a lease to run certain parts of that property.
- Workhouse Hiring Process
 - Necessary to propel the vision forward
 - New hires include:
 - Director, Lucy Burns Museum
 - Vice President, Development
 - Special Events/Rentals Director
 - Facility Manager
 - Visitor Associates
 - Working with a new marketing consultant
 - Will be hiring in the future:
 - Vice President, Finance
 - Director of Marketing
- o Master Planning Efforts
 - Fairfax County master planning process has been underway for the entire campus, and the plan will be implemented soon
 - In the interim, other progress has been made that helps the Workhouse realize its vision



- o Renovation of two buildings facing Ox Road
 - Buildings known as W-13 and W-15
 - Greatly enhancing curb appeal and walking entrances into the campus
 - Between the two buildings will be a connecting plaza with a little stage and outdoor seating
 - Once these renovations are completed and these buildings are leased out to new commercial establishments, these spaces will become extensions of those establishments
 - Lease tenants could include a small coffee shop, brewery or restaurant
 - Total project timeline estimation: two years
 - First phase of construction will take approximately 1 year to complete, and then another year to complete construction within the buildings in the second phase once lease establishments are identified.
- o Other dream "possibilities"
 - These concepts are all in motion for consideration amidst the master planning efforts
 - W-22 "The Barn"
 - Envisioned as a Music Barn for outdoor musical performances and community activity
 - W-12 Professional Theatre
 - Envisioned as a 400-seat theatre
 - W-1 Large-Scale Event Center



- Envisioned for weddings, Bat Mitzvahs, Birthdays, Special Events, etc.
- New sophisticated and consistent marketing presence
 - Includes consistent branding/logos
 - Building a new mobile-friendly website
 - Expecting to be launched January 2022
- Workhouse received a significant Cares Act Grant, from the SBA program called SVOG (Shuttered Venue Operators Grant)
 - As a result of that funding, a new musical series will start in February 2022
 - Musical Series will be called "On Stage" and will provide live music at the Workhouse
 - Grant money will also be used for community outreach theatre programs and to add additional entertainment to the Mount Vernon Summer Night series at the Workhouse
 - Also creating a Music Works Festival
 - Could be 1-3 days during the first weekend in June 2022
 - Will feature live music, craft beer & visual arts
- QUESTION: One slide referred to a possible event center. There is also an event center at Occoquan Regional Park. Is there sufficient demand for both?
 - ANSWER: Master Planning will help evaluate these possibilities as we move down the road.
 From experience, there is always a need for rental event space. We suspect event space at the



Workhouse will be well-utilized and will not compete with other event centers nearby, despite the similarities.

- O QUESTION: In one illustration, you had a theatre in a brick building – one existing building does have a stage that was graffitied and supposed to be preserved, did you encounter that?
 - ANSWER: From my understanding, that building (W-12) was originally a theatre when the Workhouse was built, but was converted at some point to a gym. Approximately 15-16 years ago, there was an initial attempt to return it to a theatre and that is when they discovered the stage that was underneath the gym floor that was built. There are several historical components & it would certainly be part of the Workhouse vision to bring it back to that state in the future.
- COMMENT: In presentations and on the new website it may help to have a birds-eye view of the buildings by number.
- OCOMMENT: There were talks of trying to coordinate with George Mason University. It houses a collection of WPA 1935-1939/40 playwright works, and at one time George Mason was producing one per year. But plans changed and they needed to pivot, so it hasn't happened in quite some time. It may be a worthwhile thing to consider.
- COMMENT: On the Saturday morning markets, please consider working with the County to obtain the required permits to host a farmers' market there as well. I think the demand exists along that corridor for travelers.



There is so much potential and I see you've begun to tap it!

- O QUESTION: Is there any consideration for additional parking at the Workhouse? Also, has the path from the equestrian center to the back of the Workhouse ever been repaired?
 - ANSWER: Leon: I don't know the answer to the second questions, but I will find out and let you know. We do have about 1000 spaces on campus.
 - ANSWER: Caroline: That path referenced is part of the cross-county trail, I believe. That is outside of the campus itself, but we can inquire.
 - COMMENT: Peyton Smith from Supervisor Storck's office will follow-up on that trail repair.
- OCOMMENT: I want to commend you on the collaboration and communication. At the Chamber, we love sharing and helping spread the word. We really enjoy watching the Workhouse grow! If there is anything the Chamber can do to assist, we are ready and willing.
 - COMMENT: Leon: We are all partners in this community. Thank you so much for your support.
- o COMMENT: President Rumberger: We will look for an update from the Workhouse in March/April. If you'd like to have a regular presence at our monthly meetings, please let us know and we will add you to the agenda.

III. SUPERVISOR REPORTS

- Springfield District Supervisor Pat Herrity
 - Not present or represented.
- Mount Vernon District Supervisor Dan Storck presented by Nick Rinehart
 - o Tour de Mount Vernon
 - 6th Annual tour occurred on October 23 with over 230 riders, including Supervisor Storck, Chairman McKay, Supervisor Alcorn, and Senator Scott Surovell
 - Newly Hired Employees Supervisor's Office
 - Transportation and Trails Aide Peyton Smith
 - Officer Manager Carmen Alfaro-Morawski
 - Alpine X/ Fairfax Peak
 - BoS held public hearing October 19 on the proposed second amendment to the Interim Agreement on Fairfax Peak, between Alpine X and the County
 - Second Amendment would allow certain additional terms for the developer to continue site design and engage the County regulatory agencies to pursue the proposed development. Those terms include:



- Extending the term of the exclusive negotiation period and ROE until December 31, 2023
- Designating the Developer as a County agent for the limited purpose of pursuing land use approvals, including any required zoning and similar regulatory approvals necessary for the construction and use of the proposed development
- This amendment solely gives the applicant/developer Alpine X the authorization to pursue land use approvals when the time is right. They are anticipating starting this process at the beginning of next year.
- Action Item on December 7 to either approve/deny Interim Agreement Amendment
 Redistricting Updates
 - Public Hearing held today on the 64 proposed redistricting maps, both from the community and from the Redistricting Committee
 - BoS is anticipated to adopt new districts at their December 7 meeting. Community input is key to the process, and the public is encouraged to offer input and comments on proposed maps.
 - Thanks to Larry and Dale for testifying on behalf of the SCF and all Lorton constituents.

- Supervisor Storck has heard input from the public hearing and will be considering all public comments from the Mount Vernon district ahead of the December 7 decision. He has not yet taken a position at this time.
- o Tidal Erosion/Living Shoreline Amendment
 - BoS approved a proposed Comprehensive Plan Amendment to the Environment Policy Plan and a Wetlands Zoning Ordinance Amendments regarding implementing legislation from Senate Bill 776 regarding living shoreline approaches to preventing tidal erosion along tidal wetlands.
 - Motion brought forth by Supervisor Smith. Supervisor Storck gave a follow-on motion to direct the Fairfax County Wetlands Board to work with the County Attorney to provide guidance on living shoreline considerations for anyone who is applying for a permit to repair an existing bulkhead or control erosion on their shoreline property
- o Lorton Visioning 2040 Study



- Meeting held last night and the task force was introduced to consultants for the planning work and market study, Design Collective & PES
- Lorton Visioning Study website now has a community engagement page where the links to subsequent meetings will be posted. Past meeting materials are also posted.

- o DRPT Springfield-Quantico Transportation Study
 - Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) is conducting a feasibility study of enhanced public transportation services between the Franconia- Springfield Metro station in Fairfax County and the Quantico Marine Base in Prince William County. Enhanced transit could include options such as additional express bus services, increased CRE commuter rail expansion, Bus Rapid Transit, or an extension of Metrorail.
 - On October 18, DRPT released the Springfield to Quantico Enhanced Public Transportation Feasibility Study Executive Summary for a 30day comment period.

- Lorton Community Center/Library
 - Completion still on track for Summer 2022. The County has had a positive experience with the construction contractor.



- o South County Police Station/Animal Shelter
 - Steel construction and station slab on grade pour is ongoing.
 - Completion date is now set for Winter 2023 due to setbacks. No further delays anticipated
- Gunston Fire Station
 - November 17 at 6:30 pm | Mason Neck Civic Association and surrounding neighborhoods to share the concept design with the community.
- o QUESTION: We know the police department is not up to full staff and are concerned that the police station will be open, but short-staffed. We were looking at getting another meeting together with the task force working on the facility, is that correct?
 - ANSWER: Yes, that is correct. We will provide an update for you next month. Christine mentioned the Chief Davis was made aware of the concern, as well as the group working on this matter.
- O QUESTION: So there won't be any further testimony on redistricting, except for through the Clerk of the Board, is that correct?
 - ANSWER: Yes, that is my understanding. The Supervisor may decide he wants more opportunities beyond that, but if anything changes we will keep you updated. The Supervisors will discuss the proposed plans and vote on a plan on December 7.



- QUESTION: Will the Supervisors simply pick a plan, or could they make modifications or create their own based on the existing plans?
- ANSWER: Peyton: Supervisor Storck plans on looking through the options with the other Supervisors. He doesn't expect that any of those particular plans will be the exact plan that is approved, it will likely be an amalgamation.

Mount Vernon District School Board Karen Corbett – Sanders, with Springfield District School Board Laura Jane Cohen

- First Quarter Completed of School Year
 - Challenges as students reacclimated to in-person learning
 - Helping students regain stamina and selfdiscipline of being back in school full-time
 - There are some disruptions due to quarantining, however we have commitment from the Superintendent to cut the quarantine for close contacts to 10 days from 14, and are urging him to further reduce (comparable to Loudon County 7 day with negative test)
- Extracurriculars are in full force
 - South County football team beat Alexandria City
 & will play West Springfield this Friday



- Band competitions where the high school band placed 9th in State
- South County Middle School will present *Lagoon* this weekend
- Transportation Issues & Substitutes
 - Bus driver pay and substitute pay was increased
 - Recruitment continues
- Annual Enrollment Report
 - South County High School increased by 55 students since 2019.
 - Middle School down by 76 students
 - Elementary School mixed
 - Newington Forest & Silverbrook increased this year after declines last year
 - Hailey had modest decline in enrollment and Laurel Hill and a more substantial decline
 - With the availability of a vaccine for children, principals are hearing from parents that they intend to send their students back to in person school in the second semester
 - Gunston Road Traffic
 - Working with police department to manage the challenges

- BoS joint meeting on November 23 to begin budget discussions
- In addition to the changes expected with new administration, we know this year will have impacts due to changes in the Local Composite Index (LCI) which determines state funding formulas and the expansion of the Standards of Quality which should be released this month
- Conversations about a step increase and marketscale adjustment for staff
- Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) Linwood Gorham



- o COMMENT: President Rumberger: I'll be sending you an email to provide an update on some lingering questions, including: Central Green bathrooms, pickle ball courts in our area, and the dog park (including what the process would be to bring it forward), garden plots, and generally where all the FCPA property exists within the South County region
 - ANSWER: We hope to continue moving the garden plot forward as we near Spring. I have a lot of confidence we can do that. The pickle ball study will be finalized soon and I'm very much a pickle ball advocate. If anyone wants to restripe existing tennis courts for pickle ball, please reach out to me and let me know.
 - COMMENT: President Rumberger: Yes, Newington Park at the corner of Monacan Drive off Silverbrook Rd. There are two full courts on there that should be considered.
 - ANSWER: As only tennis courts, many of these courts have been underused for years. There is a very large push for these to be striped, with many open to it – though there has been some push back from tennis users that do not support restriping in the northern part of the County.
 - QUESTION: Why can't you make them both tennis ball and pickle ball courts?



 ANSWER: They are. It is a creative striping scheme that can be used for both sports.
 Essentially, you can create two pickle ball courts for every one tennis court and there are no tennis courts being taken out of service. Instead, we're just creating additional lines for the use of pickle ball players as well.

- o Infrastructure Bill
 - Passed on Friday
 - Do not currently have numbers on the Long Bridge, but will provide them to SCF soon
 - Virginia has 577 bridges in poor condition, and 2,100 miles of highway that falls under the same category
 - Entire DMV area has 800 bridges and 4,700 miles of highway that are in poor condition
 - Bill was essential to building a better foundation to change us from reactive to proactive
 - Commute time in Virginia has historically increased by 8% on average each year.
 - Virginia is expecting \$7B for highway programs,
 \$537M for bridge replacements and \$1.2B for improved public transportation
 - Nationally, the total bill is \$550B
 - \$110B for Roads and Bridges
 - \$105B for Public Transit
 - o \$73B for Power & Infrastructure
 - \$65B for High-Speed Internet



- \$55B Clean Water
- o \$25B for Airports
- \$65B for additional programs that include environmental readiness, electric vehicles, etc.

- COMMENT: Thanks for mentioning the Long Bridge improvements, we'll wait to hear from you. Since you also happen to cover a portion of Prince William County, please consider a widening of the Occoquan River Bridge to lessen the backups to Lorton from Occoquan.
 - COMMENT: Marlon: One community project last year (there were 10) was for the expansion of that bridge, which will hopefully lead to a lessening of congestion.

 - Shifting landscape of the General Assembly (election last week) and we appear to have a change in leadership in the House of Delegates

- O COMMENT: Please connect with Peyton Smith in Supervisor Storck's office to determine when the last FCDOT/VDOT Bridge Check occurred. We're hoping to obtain an assessment (at one point they were being graded in a lettering system) of all bridges within the South County Federation boundaries. We're aiming to have that in January to focus on transportation priorities.

V. COMMITTEE REPORTS

• Transportation, Peter Weyland, Chair

- o Gunston Elementary School traffic
 - Supervisor Storck and the Franconia Police Chief are actively working on this issue
 - Emphasis here really is on safety of the children, rather than just a traffic issue
 - Still hoping for increased bus usage with the availability of vaccines for children



Infrastructure Bill

- Virginia will get quite a bit of support.
- Long Bridge expansion is a key transportation issue (new railroad bridge over the Potomac river that will allow for twice as much traffic and improve the biggest bottleneck in the northeast corridor)

Amtrak traffic backups

- Have experienced backups all the way to Lewis Chapel Rd.
- Paying close attention to this matter and will provide further information at the next meeting after discussing with Amtrak and the Franconia Police Department

Poles on Gunston Road

 Power has been moved, but now waiting on Cox & Verizon to remove cable lines to fully remediate this serious safety issue and remove poles that are very close to a roadway

CSX Bridge

- CSX tracks over Route 1
- They will eliminate concrete buttress that is between the two roadways so that it will accommodate 3 lines going in each direction, as well as shared use path for pedestrians and bicycles



- Estimated \$49M project started in 2023 and completed in 2027
- COMMENT: The 3 lanes that will be going South will be dumping into 2 exits.
 - COMMENT: They will be working on the corridor between Occoquan and the bridge
- O QUESTION: Will the north-bound and south-bound lanes be one-way only starting at the Rt 1 and VA-600 intersection? There are a lot of vehicles that back up traffic as they are turning out of a business (such as the rock/gravel yard). If there is a vehicle turning left, they back up both south-bound and north-bound traffic and it is very unsafe.
 - ANSWER: I'm not sure that has been taken into consideration, but I do think the issue is understood. I'll be happy to dig into this further and provide an update next time.

• Public Safety, Jonathan Kiell, Chair

No additional items to report.

• Land Use, Nick Firth, Chair

- o Popeyes
 - Under construction, with completion expected in Spring 2022
- Amazon Fresh



• There are distribution chain issues getting inner equipment (shelving). This pushed their estimated opening to mid-December.

o Panera Bread

- The lease sign is up for the space next to the Panera Bread (approximately 1500 sq ft. of space).
- Panera is still anticipating an early Spring completion.
- New Hope Church
 - Expansion plan is being considered to increase their school program and put in some sport amenities for the kids.
 - This is at the beginning stages of the process, but we expect a concept to be shared in the future.
- COMMENT: Lidl has started construction. Do we have a timeline?
 - ANSWER: They bring in their own crew to do construction, and I believe it is next year.

• Environmental & Parks, Vacant

Shoreline Erosion Amendment



- Amending Environmental element of the policy plan in the Comprehensive Plan that discusses tidal erosion and living shoreline mitigation
- Also Amending Chapter 116 of the County Code to match the recently passed General Assembly legislation
- QUESTION: What is the definition of living shoreline? There is a concern that homeowners might have incredible costs if you live alongside any waterway in terms of extreme measures for building, replacement, etc.
- ANSWER: Those same questions propelled Supervisor Storck to ask the Wetlands Board to work with the County Attorney so that we could provide better/clearer guidance to those applying for permits. My understanding is, if you wanted to use another approach, you have to provide a justification for why the living shoreline approach would not be suitable. This is all dictated by the State, the Virginia Institute of Marine Science & the Virginia Marine Resource Commission. We're hoping the Wetlands Board will engage in a community process to get feedback from impacted homeowners.
- COMMENT: The Mount Vernon Civic Association Co-Chair has asked SCF to unite with them on this issue. They have canals and other places that are bulkheaded in Upper Mount Vernon and it has potential for a big impact,



including an incredible cost for replacement and an onerous process.

VI. OLD BUSINESS

- Redistricting Proposals
 - The Executive Board has worked on this effort for 2+months.
 - There is an opportunity to expand the number of magisterial districts in Fairfax County. We provided testimony today for one of our proposed maps (of 10 districts).
 - 14 people spoke at the hearing, including 6 from the Mount Vernon District – with no representation from Sully, Springfield or Lee districts.
 - 3 of 6 spoke specifically in support of our presentation, but others suggested an office location in the South County area would suffice for at least another 10 years connected to the Mount Vernon District. One specific speaker (Montibello Condo Associates) were there to discuss some proposed maps moving them into Lee district to balance numbers.
 - The Mount Vernon is one of the most populous magisterial districts in the County
 - We will be submitting our spoken testimony for posting on the SCF website, including the maps we presented (to be posted on our website).
 - We are in opposition of the existing process, which we think needs a public disclosure of the decision-making process rather than moving straight to a vote at the next BoS meeting in December.



- We don't believe we've outgrown the Mount Vernon district, but we are concerned about whether our future direction lies along the Richmond Highway corridor, or out Ox Rd and into the Burke area (which is what our proposed South Fairfax magisterial district would do)
- We were very firm that no one that is currently in the SCF boundaries should be removed to balance other district problems.
